APT's 114-passenger Bahamasflagged *Caledonian Sky* is currently sitting in Darwin Harbour, and the company has asked that it be exempted; however a Federal Court judge has warned that such a ruling would potentially impact all foreign cruise vessels in Australian territory.

A formal hearing was scheduled for noon today.

Clearly Webjet is working to save every cent, telling investors who have not opted to receive electronic communications that it will only mail out black-and white copies of the documents and presentations.

Eligible shareholders are those who held stakes in Webjet as at 7pm on 03 Apr 2020.

Webjet has seen its shares tumble from pre-COVID highs of more than \$10, with the company announcing sweeping cuts including the suspension of its Webjet Exclusives offering and the closure of the Online Republic Cruise Sale Finder operation.

#### Vale David Bell

**TRAVEL** industry veteran David Bell has died in Sydney after a short illness, aged almost 80.

Bell began his career in TV, but then moved into travel, initially in the PR department of fledgling NZ carrier TEAL and then onto Cathay Pacific where he was based in Hong Kong as head of PR for more than 20 years.

He later returned to Australia, undertaking a range of activities including another stint with CX.

He is survived by his wife and three children, and was remembered at a private funeral yesterday, witnessed electronically by a "virtual horde of aviation journalists and travel trade luminaries".

AIRLINES - the retail travel industry needs your help.

We ask that you consider getting together with airline colleagues to come up with a workable strategy to help better manage the current flood of waivers, commercial policies, bulletins, exception policies, updates etc.

The airlines deserve much praise for what they have tried to achieve during this pandemic, and the distribution system is probably the least of their worries now. But... I cannot sit idly by and watch the impact on the health and wellbeing of people in our industry without at least trying to reach out to have some stability imposed, as we all work tirelessly to rebuild.

I am reaching out to the policy makers to talk to industry leaders and your own teams to discuss the serious health impact that the above rules are having on them. The STRESS FACTOR almost outweighs the fear of what is ahead for us all over the next few months. This you have all unwittingly contributed to.



## IATA warns of aviation catastrophe

**THE** International Air Transport Association says plummeting demand for travel amid the COVID-19 crisis is putting about 25 million jobs at risk.

"Globally the livelihoods of some 65.6 million people are dependent on the aviation industry, including sectors such as travel and tourism," IATA said.

"In a scenario of severe travel restrictions lasting for three months, IATA research calculates that 25 million jobs in aviation and related sectors are endangered across the world."

Airlines are calling on governments to provide immediate financial aid, with IATA calling for direct financial support, tax relief and loans.

"There are no words to adequately describe the devastating impact of COVID-19 on the airline industry," said IATA CEO Alexandre de Juniac.


He also confirmed IATA was working on a comprehensive approach to "re-booting the industry" once COVID-19 restrictions are eased.

### KLM's Sydney touchdown



**KLM** Royal Dutch Airlines has been operating flights to Australia for the first time in two decades over the last week (**pictured**), bringing home almost 2,000 travellers from the Netherlands.

The services are operated in collaboration with the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs, with the airline's Chief Operating Officer, Rene de Groot, saying "these flights are extra special in KLM's history.

"We have had a strong relationship with Australia since 1950, as the country has been a valuable destination in our network for over 50 years."

Quentin Voss, Country Manager for Air France KLM Australia & NZ, said the two KLM repatriation services had also been conducted in cooperation with Qantas.

Dutch travellers currently abroad who are unable to arrange their return themselves due to the coronavirus crisis can register for assistance at bijzonderbijstandbuitenland.nl.

#### Aurora rescue

**AURORA** Expeditions has confirmed that Aussie pax aboard its *Greg Mortimer* will return to Melbourne within the next 48-72 hours, with the assistance of the Department of Foreign Affairs.

A chartered Airbus A340 will operate a special flight, with COVID-19-positive and -negative passengers to be separated into different cabin areas.

#### **EY plots MEL return**

**ETIHAD** Airways has announced additional flights from Abu Dhabi to Melbourne and Amsterdam, as part of an updated schedule of special passenger services.

EY has been operating flights to allow passengers stranded in the United Arab Emirates the opportunity to return home, and the operations also support the "UAE Food Security Program" by utilising belly-hold capacity of passenger aircraft for cargo.

Five weekly AUH-MEL serices are currently planned to operate from 08-21 Apr, with EY also flying to Amsterdam, Seoul, Singapore, Manila and Jakarta.

#### Accor helps out

AS WELL as participating in government-backed programs to accommodate returning travellers and health professionals during the COVID-19 crisis, Accor is also extending its hospitality to vulnerable families, the homeless and the disadvantaged.

Accor Pacific Chief Operating Officer, Simon McGrath, said "welcoming, protecting and taking care of others is at the heart of what Accor does best".

He highlighted other acts of kindness by properties in the Accor network, including Mercure Sunshine Coast Kawana Waters which prepared dozens of meals for health professionals at a nearby hospital.

NICOLA Strudwick, GM Sales at Travellers Choice, has been named "Australian Skalleague of the Year" by industry networking club Skal International.





Scenes from the movie showing the stars at a market and riding camels in the desert are set to promote Abu Dhabi tourism, even though they were actually filmed in Morocco.



Due to COVID-19, Tongan borders are closed, a state of emergency has been declared, and a national lockdown is in force, and those travelling in the country should follow the advice of local authorities and monitor local media for updates.

The cyclone has already lashed the Solomon Islands and Vanuatu, and is today bearing towards Fiji where a tropical cyclone alert is in force for some of the southern islands and residents of coastal areas of Viti Levu have been advised to evacuate and move to higher ground.
