NSW travel changes

WA HAS put new restrictions in place for visitors coming from NSW following a COVID-19 outbreak on Syd's Nthn Beaches.

From 12.01am (AWST) today, travellers from NSW will need to quarantine for 14 days and have a COVID test on day 11 of their stay, while Qld stated anyone entering the state from the cluster area must be tested and self-isolate for two weeks.

Flight Centre + Hotelbeds

HOTELBEDS has signed a deal with Flight Centre to increase its global distribution reach.

The deal will see Hotelbeds increase its retail distribution in Australia, as well as Canada, Dubai, Hong Kong, India, New Zealand, South Africa, the United Kingdom, and the United States.

Hotelbeds' 180,000 properties, available through its retail channel Bedsonline, will be available to Flight Centre's clients, with the bedbank keen to access the travel agency's long-haul guests, who book top-rated, higher-value properties further in advance.

Flight Centre's guests also stay for longer, have lower cancellation rates and spend more, Hotelbeds noted.

As part of the partnership, Flight Centre will connect to Hotelbeds' product portfolio via the bedbank's API solutions.

Flight Centre will also now

offer its clients ancillary services from Hotelbeds' Beyond The Bed portfolio, which comprises 25,000 transfer routes and 18,000 activities in more than 680 destinations, and 30,000 pick-up locations in 170 countries.

BA slashes Sydney

BRITISH Airways has cut more than 15 long-haul routes due to the pandemic, indicating it will not resume its Sydney services until late Oct 2021 at the earliest.

Other destinations BA will no longer fly to next year include Abu Dhabi, Bangkok, KL & Seoul.

The decision follows BA's parent company, International Airlines Group, announcing a pre-tax loss of €6.2 billion for the nine months to Sep.

In a grim forecast, passenger numbers are not expected to return to 2019 levels until at least 2023, BA noted.

Unlucky 13 agents ex ATAS

THE travel industry rescue package has come too late for several members of the AFTA Travel Accreditation Scheme (ATAS), which has confirmed multiple withdrawals in the last few weeks due to business closures and insolvencies.

An update on the AFTA website notes the ATAS “voluntary withdrawal due to closure” of businesses such as Gate 1 Travel Australia (ABN 74 169 034 575), and Webjet’s Cruise Sale Finder (ABN 46 169 712 814).

Also closing in the last month has been Victorian agencies St Arnaud Travel & Cruise (ABN 89 139 383 016) and Your World@ Glenelg (ABN 88 071 743 907).

The list of voluntary withdrawals includes school group specialist Educational World Travel (ABN 22 006 888 179) which was placed into voluntary liquidation in early Dec, and Personalised Travel (ABN 12 294 890 196).

Altitude Travel (ABN 58 078 735 789) in Tea Gardens, NSW has closed, along with Broad Horizons Travel in Yamba, NSW (ABN 57 126 073 265).

AFTA has also confirmed the cancellation of ATAS participation of Sydney-based Travel Design Group (ABN 87 624 451 458) which had liquidators appointed earlier this month.

Three other agencies - United Global Travels, Freedom Travel and Passport Travel - are listed as having closed but are believed to have actually just hibernated their ATAS accreditation.

Oceania EOTY deals

OCEANIA Cruises has launched its Year-End Upgrade Sale offering major price reductions and the option of selecting a four category stateroom upgrade at no extra cost when booking select itineraries by the end of the year.

WEX completes eNett acquisition

IT SERVICE management company WEX has completed its acquisition of travel payment solutions firm eNett (TD 28 Jan).

WEX paid a total consideration of approximately US\$577.5 million for eNett, as well as fellow B2B transactions company Optal.

Qantas adds seven regional routes

QANTAS will add seven new routes across NSW, SA and Vic starting from Feb, bringing its total local routes to 62 - five more than pre-COVID levels.

New services include Syd/Griffith, Mel/Newcastle, Mel/Mt Gambier, Mel/Wagga Wagga, Mel/Albury & Adel/Mt Gambier.

The expansion has prompted Regional Express to call for the Fed Govt to cease all funding to Qantas, claiming it is trying to “eliminate weaker competitors”.

Challenge to travel ban

LIBERTARIAN thinktank LibertyWorks has initiated a challenge to Australia's overseas travel ban in the Federal Court, arguing Section 96 of the Biosecurity Act does not give the Federal Government the right to enact a blanket ban.

The group contends the section only prevents an "individual" from leaving Australia for a period of less than 28 days.

"Minister Greg Hunt has overstepped his legislative powers in preventing Australians from going overseas," argues LibertyWorks President Andrew Cooper.

"It's an illiberal and draconian restriction on the free movement of Australian citizens, many of whom want to see family and loved ones or attend urgent business in other countries.

"Preventing people from going overseas does nothing to make Australia safer," he added.

Cooper adds that invalidating the ban on overseas travel would not diminish the country's ability to impose quarantine restrictions on returning Australians.

The Federal Government recently extended the prohibition on Australian citizens being able to travel outside the country until mid-Mar 2021, representing a three-month extension of its emergency powers (**TD** 09 Dec).

This is not the first court challenge launched against the Federal Govt by LibertyWorks, with the group also arguing against Australia's foreign influence transparency scheme, contending it breaches freedom of political communication.

MEANWHILE Flight Centre MD Graham Turner has called for international travel to resume with or without a vaccine, "with the right protocols, there should be very little risk," he told *The Courier-Mail* this week.

World Exp backs NZ

WITH news of a possible travel bubble with NZ in Q1 next year (**TD** 15 Dec), World Expeditions is offering a \$0 deposit for travel across the Tasman from 01 Mar, in addition to other global destinations from 01 Sep.

Biz travel vital

A national TAA Board meeting this week - the first in-person gathering since Mar - aired concerns about what the future of business travel will look like, with members canvassing options to increase conferencing and events in state capitals.

Singapore open for business

SINGAPORE’S Government has announced a new initiative which will allow a “limited number of business, official and high economic value travellers” to enter the country for short-term stays of up to 14 days.

Dubbed Connect@Singapore, the program is part of the city-state’s efforts to reopen its borders in a controlled and safe manner, according to Singapore Minister for Trade and Industry, Chan Chun Sing.

“This will facilitate essential global business exchanges and support the revival of Singapore’s air hub status and hospitality sector,” Minister Chan said.

Strict health and testing protocols will apply, with travellers under the initiative housed in a “bubble” with dedicated facilities.

They will undergo regular testing and strictly observe all safety measures in place, and will be able to conduct meetings with local visitors and other traveller groups while in the facilities.

Travellers will have to present a negative COVID-19 PCR test prior to leaving their home country, obtain a PCR test on arrival in Singapore and undertake Antigen Rapid Tests on days three, five, seven and 11 of their stay.

Within the appointed facilities travellers will have to stay within their pre-declared group of up to

five travellers.

The Government is seeking expressions of interest from hotels interested in participating in the initiative, and has been working with Changi Airport and The Ascott Limited about the possible use of specially designed self-service meeting rooms at the airport as part of the program.

Applications for travel to Singapore under the initiative will open in mid-Jan, with the first travellers likely to be welcomed later in the month.

Connect@Singapore will be open to visitors from any country, complementing other travel lanes that have already been established with particular nations under the Reciprocal Green Lane initiative.

And that deep-fried rattlesnake.. hm, I think I'll pass...*

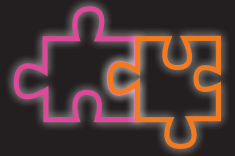
*Our businesses have gone through a new transformation,

BORDER crossings are never usually this fun.

A new service in the Spanish town of Sanlucar de Guadiana allows travellers to quickly transit into Portugal - by riding an exhilarating zip line.

Cunard safety

CUNARD Line has made a number of updates to its health and safety protocols, mainly affecting guests with pre-existing medical conditions.

The cruise line will no longer accept guests who require supplementary oxygen (including via an oxygen concentrator), dialysis, or mechanical ventilatory support (except for overnight CPAP for sleep apnoea).

The line will also deny ship access to those who have been unwell with confirmed or suspected COVID-19 in the 14 days prior to embarkation, or have been in close contact with someone with confirmed or suspected COVID cases.

Boeing in-house

WITH its troubled 737 Max aircraft due to enter service around the world soon, Boeing has reportedly hired 160 pilots in-house to help create a smooth transition back to full operation.

The new "Global Engagement Pilots" will act as instructors and cockpit observers on 35-day assignments, part of an international strategy which also includes 24/7 surveillance of 737 Max flights to reassure the sector.

Pullman Manila

ACCOR has flagged the opening of the Pullman Manila at Primex Tower in 2023 in the Philippines, a 200-room upscale property featuring a gym and pool.

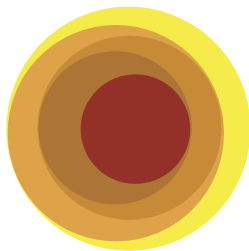
