## Grant applications to open on 14 Dec

THE Government has provided more details of the $\$ 128$ million COVID-19 Consumer Travel Support Program for travel agents (TD 01 Dec), with eligible businesses able to apply for a claim from 14 Dec 2020.
To be eligible for a payment a business must have been operating as "either a travel agent or tour arrangement service provider prior to the announcement of the closure of international borders by the Prime MInister on 19 Mar 2020," have had an annual turnover starting from \$50,000 through to a maximum of $\$ 20$ million for the 2019 calendar year, and been in receipt of the extension of the JobKeeper payment which was available from 28 Sep 2020 through until 28 Mar 2021.
Payments will be scaled based on turnover, from \$1,500 through to $\$ 100,000$, and claims will be processed and administered by Services Australia.
The full program guidelines will be available shortly, according to a fact sheet at austrade.gov.au.

## Bendigo back on

THE reopening of the NSWVic border has seen Qantaslink resume direct flights between Bendigo and Sydney, as the first services to the region since Apr. QF is operating a 50-seat Q300 turboprop on the route.

## Travel ban extended to Mar

INTERNATIONAL outbound travel by Australians will not be possible until at least midMar 2021, after Minister for Health Greg Hunt declared a three-month extension to the human biosecurity emergency declaration (TD breaking news yesterday).
The emergency period has now been in place since 18 Mar 2020, when the Smartraveller advisory for all destinations across the globe was lifted to the highest "Do not travel" level.
Hunt said the Australian Health Protection Principal Committee had advised that "the international COVID-19 situation continues to pose an unacceptable public health risk," with the extension of the biosecurity emergency period seen as an "appropriate response to that risk".
The update means the Overseas Travel Ban Emergency Requirements Determination 2020 remains in place until 17 Mar 2021, which stipulates that "an Australian citizen or permanent resident must not leave Australian territory as a passenger on an outgoing aircraft

or vessel," with some exemptions allowed including air or ship crew members, people whose travel is associated with essential work at an offshore facility or people travelling on official government business.
Exceptional circumstances provisions also allow exemptions to the measure to be granted by the Australian Border Force Commissioner.
Hunt noted the restrictions are reviewed regularly, and "can be amended or removed at any time based on the expert medical advice".
The updated recommendation, which is still subject to ratification by the Governor General, also imposes limitations on the movement of cruise vessels, but interestingly Hunt also noted the Government was "working closely with state and territory agencies and the cruise sector to develop a framework for the staged resumption of cruise ships in a manner that is proportionate to the public health risk".

## 737 MAX relaunch

BRAZILIAN domestic carrier GOL will become the first carrier in the world to resume flying the Boeing 737 MAX on commercial routes, with the first services in and out of Sao Paulo to recommence later today.
GOL has seven 737 MAXs in its fleet, and before re-integrating them into service has conducted type-specific training for 140 of its pilots using a Boeing 737 MAX simulator in the USA.
The company, which has a future pipeline of 95 MAX orders for delivery over the next decade, also completed a "rigorous series of technical flights" following the meticulous work of removing the aircraft from storage in Belo Horizonte, where they have been located since the global grounding 20 months ago.

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## VA MAX revision

VIRGIN Australia Group this morning confirmed it had reached agreement with Boeing on a restructured 737 MAX order and delivery schedule.
The new order book now comprises 25 B737 MAX 10 aircraft which are scheduled for delivery from mid-2023.
The carrier will no longer receive any of the previously ordered 23 MAX 8 variants, with VA CEO Jayne Hrdlicka saying the deal "represents a deep commitment to the future" from Virgin's new owners, Bain Capital.
"We have already moved to simplify our mainline fleet and committed to the Boeing 737 aircraft as the backbone of our future domestic and short-haul international operations," she said. Hrdlicka also confirmed VA remained in discussions with manufacturers on a fleet strategy to support the reintroduction of widebody services when longhaul travel demand returns.

## Fox, Haberle to inspire industry

After a relatively brief hiatus they have decided to go out on their own, with The Inspire Collective underpinned by a "values-based approach to drive positive impacts for their clients". Fox told Travel Daily she believes there are new opportunities for businesses in the ever-changing world.
"This presents an ideal time to regroup, pivot or refine their offering and align their teams' culture to continue their growth pathways," she said.

Authorities in Barcelona have confirmed that four of the lions in the city zoo are the latest victims of COVID-19.
It's only the second known case of large felines contracting coronavirus, with Zala, Nima, Run Run and Kiumbe testing positive after keepers noticed they were showing signs of the virus - presumably via some extra-hoarse roaring.
Two staff at the zoo have also tested positive, with authorities making contact to discuss the issue with New York's Bronx Zoo, where four tigers and three lions also tested positive for COVID-19 back in Apr.

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Australia's first carbon-neutral hotel


PINETREES Lodge on Lord Howe Island off the NSW coast (pictured) has achieved the distinction of being the first fullservice hotel in Australia to gain certification under the Federal Government's Climate Active


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Program.
Achieving the rigorous Climate Active Carbon Neutral Standard involved analysis of all sources of carbon emissions from the business, including electricity, freight, F\&B, transport and more. A five million dollar renovation helped reduce the carbon footprint including refurbishment of all guest rooms following solar passive design principles, a 95\% conversion to LED lights, installation of new wiring, a new commercial refrigeration plant, plus water saving plumbing and wastewater systems.
"We also changed the restaurant and laundry operations to reduce water and power consumption, invested in new vehicles, reduced waste, installed worm farms and compost bins, and built a large organic market garden to limit food miles," said Pinetree Lodge owner Luke Hanson.
"All up, we reduced our power consumption by $30 \%$ and water consumption by $35 \%$. It is a fantastic outcome," he said.

His 30-year career has also seen him work with major hotel brands on the Gold Coast as well as in Tokyo, Melbourne and Sydney.

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## Jetstar Asia catering

JETSTAR Asia (3K) says the reintroduction of on-board food and drinks this month is a "big step forward in the airline's recovery," with the carrier ramping up flights from Singapore to eight key destinations across Southeast Asia.
Initially passengers are able to pre-purchase items prior to departure and be served on board, but from 21 Dec on-board catering will be extended further to allow purchases during flight, but only using credit cards as 3 K moves to a cashless cabin.

## Emotional support crackdown in USA

THE US Department of Transportation has issued a new rule which should put paid to the days of passengers insisting on travelling with "emotional support" animals such as horses, peacocks, monkeys and turkeys.
The update aims to close a loophole which mandated that airlines had to allow travellers to bring a companion animal on board if they needed it for medical purposes.
The new rule defines a service animal strictly as a "dog,
regardless of breed or type, that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of a qualified individual with a disability, including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual or other mental disability".
Passengers must provide airlines with documentation of the disability, as well as certification that the dog is a service animal.

## HA adds four more

HAWAIIAN Airlines has begun ticket sales for its nonstop services between Honolulu and the mainland destinations of Austin, Ontario and Orlando.
Beginning 11 Mar, Hawaiian will offer two weekly flights between Honolulu and Orlando, while HNL and ONT will be connected five times weekly, and from 21 Apr, two weekly flights will begin from Honolulu to Austin.
Hawaiian is also adding services between Kahului and Long Beach, beginning 09 Mar.
The carrier is also offering its guests dedicated pre-travel COVID-19 testing services which allow them to avoid quarantine.
