THE Federal Government has updated its four-stage plan for post-COVID normality to include vaccination targets needed to unlock a return to overseas travel - however precise timelines are vet to be revealed.

Following a National Cabinet meeting on Fri, Prime Minister Scott Morrison confirmed Australia would need to attain 70% of the eligible population (aged 16 and over) fully vaccinated for the industry to take its next key step in Phase B. When this is achieved, the Government said it would reduce quarantine arrangements for vaccinated residents and restore inbound passenger caps to previous levels for unvaccinated returning travellers.

Larger caps for vaccinated returning travellers would also be introduced, as well as a green light for capped entry of student and economic visa holders.

But for all restrictions on outbound travel for vaccinated Australians to be lifted, Morrison confirmed the country would need to have 80% of its residents

vaccinated, with Phase C to see the travel bubble program extended for unrestricted travel to a range of new candidate countries - likely to initially include Pacific Island nations and countries such as Singapore.

At this time, Australia will see a gradual re-opening of inbound and outbound international travel with "safe countries" for vaccinated travellers, defined by Morrison as being countries with a similar vaccination levels that Australia has at that stage.

The Prime Minister noted that Australia could reach the 70% Phase B milestone before the end of the year, with the latest data from the ABC suggesting at the current rate of 1.2 million doses a week, the country could potentially expect to have its adult population fully vaccinated by early Jan 2022.

QF reduces Norfolk

QANTAS Airways has cut some Norfolk Island flights to and from Brisbane & Sydney until 29 Aug.

Travellers are permitted to rebook to another Qantasoperated flight, retain the value of the ticket in credit, or are entitled to a refund.

Once a ticket has been reissued, subsequent changes are subject to fare rules and conditions, unless the policy stipulated, or unless covered by another commercial policy.

Change fees do not apply, nor do additional fares or taxes, and if a new fare is of a higher value, the difference is payable by pax.

NZ supplier group

A NEW coalition of travel industry suppliers has been formed in New Zealand, with the aim of coordinating lobbying activity and calling for combined government support.

The New Zealand Outbound Travel Suppliers Association has about 25 members at this stage, and is chaired by Joseph O'Sullivan from Cruise World who is also a director of Cruise Traveller in Australia.

The group has been working alongside the Travel Agents Association of NZ (TAANZ) throughout the pandemic to highlight the issues being faced by tour operators, with the newly created association giving the organisation a formal structure.

The committee also includes Wendy Wu Tours NZ MD Paul Dymond, Robyn Galloway from Innovative Travel and Marija Kapiteli from Croatia Times Travel.

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Nadi Airport funding deal

FIJI'S travel and tourism credentials are poised to receive a major boost with news of a \$68 million Australian Governmentfunded loan to improve the country's airport infrastructure.

The cash injection will see a range of upgrades take place at Nadi International Airport, as well as several smaller airports, allowing the Pacific Island nation to bolster its air capacity when international travel finally returns, *The Sydney Morning Herald* reports.

Improvements will include creating more parking spaces to accommodate larger aircraft, as well as key upgrade and maintenance projects.

Air NZ rallies in Jun

AIR New Zealand has managed to demonstrate strong improvement in the number of passengers carried in Jun, improving by 150% on the same period last year to 901,000 pax.

The vast majority of bookings were driven by short-haul flights, with long-haul services still at a virtual standstill, accounting for only 5,000 passengers in Jun. that Nadi International Airport is equipped with facilities to serve as the gateway to the new normal for the entire Pacific - connecting our region to the world," Fijian Attorney-General Aiyaz Sayed-Khaiyum said.

Funding will be allocated from the Australian Infrastructure Financing Facility for the Pacific purse, a resource designed to prop up the economies of countries in the Pacific, as well as to compete with heightened Chinese investment in the region.

Microsoft Oyo buy?

MICROSOFT is reportedly in negotiations to acquire Indian budget hotel chain Oyo, in a deal that could be worth at least US\$9 billion if it goes ahead.

The speculation was first published by *TechCrunch*, which reported a future deal may also involve Oyo shifting to use Microsoft's cloud services.

Airbnb-backed Oyo has between US\$780 million to US\$800 million in its bank, a recent virtual conference for the company revealed, and has trimmed its monthly cash burn rate from US\$5 million to US\$4 million.

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Hostel biz rescued

A RESCUE plan from a mystery investor to save Nomads and Base hostels from going under has been approved by creditors, *The Advertiser* reports.

The proposal was ratified at a creditors' meeting on Fri, and will see control of the group return to its four directors, and the Nomads and Base hostels brands continue to trade.

Owners Tourism Adventure Group flagged financial issues could force its properties to close in early Jul (*TD* 05 Jul).

Stop human traffic

THE World Travel & Tourism Council (WTTC) has authored a new report which puts forward a framework for how the global travel sector can best tackle the scourge of human trafficking.

Released in conjunction with the Carlson Family Foundation, the report focuses on the four key pillars of awareness, education and training, advocacy, and support, arming countries and private companies with better advice to combat transnational crimes which are often much harder to identify and expose.

The WTTC also argues the pandemic has exacerbated the issue of human trafficking, "accelerating the urgent need for targeted actions".

SIA quarter boost

SINGAPORE Airlines Group (SIA) has narrowed its first quarter loss to SG\$409 million, from SG\$1.12 billion for the prior corresponding period.

Passenger traffic is also up, with capacity rising to 28% of prepandemic levels, as the Singapore Airlines Group progressively rebuilds its network and navigates uncertainties.

Group expenditure also fell by SG\$319 million, down 16.9%.



Domestic air gaps widen

THE gap in domestic corporate fare prices between Qantas and Virgin Australia has widened in 2021, according to a blue paper compiled by travel procurement consultancy Butler Caroye.

The report showed that domestic corporate fares for Q2 of 2021 was \$289 on average for Qantas and \$181 for Virgin Australia, with most of the gap widening due to a price decrease from VA from Q1 of this year.

The airline reduced its average fare by \$23 compared to the previous quarter, whereas Qantas fares only decreased by \$4 during the same time.

Rotterdam delivery

HOLLAND America Line has officially taken delivery of its *Rotterdam* vessel during a handover ceremony at one of Fincantieri's Italian shipyards.

Marking the 11th ship in the cruise line's fleet, the 2,668-guest *Rotterdam* will commence its maiden season in the Caribbean from Fort Lauderdale in Florida later in the year, with onboard features including several gourmet restaurants and the Rolling Stone Rock Room music venue churning out classic hits. major carriers has nearly doubled since H1 2019, the paper also showed, and while both carriers have tightened the availability of cheaper domestic fares, the figures show Qantas has done this to a greater extent.

Further findings included a case for buyers to pursue a best-fare-of-the-day approach, with COVID making it an even better proposition, offering more savings overall than pursuing regular airline deals.

Qantas loses case

QANTAS has indicated it intends to appeal a Federal Court judgement that ruled in favour of the Transport Workers Union of Australia regarding the outsourcing of the airline's ground-handling functions.

The court found the move to outsource crew had breached the Fair Work Act, with Qantas failing to convince the judge that its decision was not motivated, at least in part, by the fact the majority of released staff were union members and had various workplace rights under enterprise agreements.



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Direct winning hotels

DIRECT website bookings became the main channel for hotel reservations in Asia last year, with 37% of market share, a portion which has increased to 41% this year, D-EDGE has found.

The hotel distribution technology provider's white paper, *Hotel distribution and the pandemic: the travel chessboard*, found that in Europe, where direct website bookings possess the second-largest market share (32%), it is the only channel in which booking levels are back to pre-pandemic quantities.

HK begs for mercy

HONG Kong's tourism sector is pleading with its government to reopen the border with China in a bid to restart the industry.

HK closed all but three border checkpoints in Feb last year as part of its response to coronavirus, and officials have refused to reopen the borders amid the country's sluggish vaccination rate.

Like Australia, Hong Kong has committed to an "elimination" goal, as opposed to "suppression", in contrast to places like the US and Europe.

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Victoria pans for gold



VICTORIA'S Central Goldfields has launched a happiness survey as part of its UNESCO World Heritage bid to measure the wellbeing of residents across tourism landmarks in the state's Central Goldfields.

Residents in 13 areas are being asked about their quality of life and how tourism might be developed in their region to strengthen the community's mental and economic wellbeing.

Around 300 people have completed the survey since it was launched on the International Day of Happiness on 20 Mar, with the aim to have at least 200 responses from residents in each of the participating areas.

So far residents have been vocal in their opinions on issues such as tourism growth, access to local shops in busy tourism periods, the desire for slow change in communities, the need to respect peace and nature, as well as facilitate heritage conservation.

The 10-15-minute survey is online and available to adults in Ararat, Ballarat, Campaspe, Central Goldfields, Golden Plains, Greater Bendigo, Hepburn, Loddon, Macedon Ranges, Moorabool, Mount Alexander, Northern Grampians, and Pyrenees local government areas.

Everyone who responds to the survey in Jul and Aug will also be entered into a draw to win \$100 tickets to Bendigo Heritage Attractions and an annual membership of the National Trust of Australia.
