BA culinary pact

BRITISH Airways has unveiled a new menu for customers in its Euro Traveller (short-haul Economy) class, with all on-board dining having to be pre-ordered.

Dubbed "Speedbird Cafe", the initiative is a partnership with Michelin-starred chef Tom Kerridge, who will design "gourmet food choices" such as signature pies and sandwiches.

The airline will continue to offer a complimentary bottle of water and a snack, but any other meals must be purchased up to 12 hours prior to departure via www.highlifeshop.com.

Other changes include preordering of in-flight retail items, which the carrier said would help reduce onboard weight.

In BA's Club Europe business class cabin new Do&Co menus will see the reintroduction of china and glassware, replacing the temporary use of COVID-safe minimum-contact meal boxes.

VA credit clampdown

TRAVEL agents who incorrectly redeem Virgin Australia Future Flight Credits (FFC) will be levied with a \$250 penalty by the carrier, under a new VA policy update released on Fri.

The revised Virgin Australia ADM/ACM policy document now confirms that processes related to FFCs will be audited, and if fares are collected incorrectly "any miscalculated values will be subject to an Agent Debit Memo (ADM)".

Future Flight Credits were the outcome of the airline's restructuring and sale to new owner, private equity firm Bain, which promised FFCs in place of existing credits for cancelled travel which had been booked prior to VA entering voluntary administration in Apr last year.

FFC capacity is strictly controlled on Virgin Australia flights, with the fares only available for U class (Economy) and I class (Business) reservations.

When booking via GDS, the FFC fares must be searched using account code FFC20.

FFCs cannot be used for upgrade purchases or be used in conjunction with travel credits of another person, and also may not be used in conjunction with Velocity Frequent Flyer points or to make a booking in conjunction with other forms of travel credits.

"Identified under-collections will attract a \$250 ADM plus an ADM fee," the new policy notes, with the same penalties applying if agents use FFCs to purchase any other fare class products on behalf of their customers.

Virgin Australia spokesman Kris Taute told **TD** the changes "reflect the introduction of Future Flight Credits as a form of payment," with a range of educational resources and FAQs on the VA agency hub - **CLICK HERE**. Today's issue of TD Travel Daily today has five

Vic greenlights interstate

Cabinet measures

NEW border measures have been introduced by National Cabinet to combat any possible community infections of the United Kingdom's new coronavirus strain in Australia.

All returning travellers will now need to undergo a pre-flight test for coronavirus, with any Australians hoping to return home required to test negative.

Masks on all domestic and international flights are now mandatory, and Australia's states and territories will not be increasing the cap on the number of repatriated Australians they are currently accommodating.

New South Wales, Queensland and WA will also reduce their cap on repatriated Aussies by 50% from next week.

"The suggestion that Australia might be able to close off every single flight that comes to Australia was considered by AHPPC and was not recommended to the National Cabinet." Prime Minister Scott Morrison said.

MEANWHILE, Qld Health has confirmed that travellers transiting through the hotspot of Brisbane onward to another destination will be able to do so without interruption.

If driving, travellers must do so without stopping, and must travel in a private vehicle, such as their own car, a rideshare or a taxicab.

They must not transit through the Brisbane area by any other mode of transport, and if flying, they must not leave the airport.

The Government of the Northern Territory has also declared Greater Brisbane is no longer deemed a coronavirus hotspot, meaning anyone arriving in the NT from Brisbane will no longer have to enter guarantine.

In further news, WA has also announced more measures to protect against COVID-19, including halving its international arrivals cap to around 512 people a week until mid-Feb, and making masks mandatory in airports.

THE Victorian Government is reportedly gearing up to introduce a new "traffic light" system for interstate travel across Australia, effectively replacing its hard border policies which had previously caused chaos for Victorians' travel plans.

The new system will require Victorian travellers to obtain a special permit available online when travelling to designated safe zones interstate.

Red zones, which at this stage include Brisbane and the entire state of NSW, will be deemed as "do not travel", while amber zones will need a permit to access and mandate travellers get a test and self isolate when they return home until they receive a negative COVID result.

Green zones will require a permit for travel, however, will not come with any test or quarantine restrictions.

Despite NSW being designated a red zone at this stage, News Limited reports this is subject to a review by the state's Chief Health Officer Brett Sutton, which could see the danger rating in parts

WestJet slashes

WESTJET has announced it is cutting more than 1,100 jobs amid a slash of its flight schedule.

Blaming the latest travel restrictions imposed by the Government of Canada, WestJet said it had seen an instant decline in travel demand.

"Immediately following the [Canadian Government's] inbound testing announcement, and with the continuation of the 14-day quarantine, we saw significant reductions in new bookings and unprecedented cancellations," said the airline's Chief Executive Officer Ed Sims.

VA expands AC loyalty

VIRGIN Australia Group has expanded its partnership with Air Canada (AC), allowing Velocity Frequent Flyer members to earn points and status credits on select flights with Air Canada travelling between Australia, Vancouver and beyond.

To be eligible, members must enter their Velocity Frequent Flyer number when booking their flight directly at aircanada.com, with **TD** informed the official Air Canada partner page will go live on the Velocity website "in the coming days".

The number of Velocity Points earned with Air Canada is based on the fare class and the number of miles travelled, with Virgin customers able to use the mileage calculator **HERE** to determine the miles flown.

Velocity Frequent Flyer members can also earn status credits with Air Canada when travelling in an eligible fare class on AC operated flights.

The status credits earned will depend on where pax fly and the fare purchased, with customers

UK should do more

TRAVEL to the United Kingdom will be hampered if quarantine restrictions on international travellers remain in place, UKinbound Chief Executive Officer Joss Croft has warned.

"No one is going to come here for a seven-day holiday if they think they have to stay in a hotel for six days before they can spend a day going back home," he said.

The trade association's head welcomed the introduction of pre-arrival coronavirus testing, but said a test after arriving in the United Kingdom is also necessary, and would avoid the need for a five-day quarantine period.

Croft called testing pre-arrival a "very positive step forward", but said it would alone not convince travellers to return to the UK when it's safe to travel again. able to use the status credit mileage calculator **HERE** to determine the miles flown. However, neither Velocity Points

nor status credits can be earned on reward seat bookings or c'shares with third party airlines.

Members travelling on upgraded fares purchased with points or by bidding for an upgrade are able to earn points as per the original fare class purchased.

Air Canada's addition of airline partners began in the lead-up to last year's relaunch of its Aeroplan loyalty program, when it partnered with Air Serbia, Azul Brazilian Airlines, Eithad Airways and Vistara.

Aeroplan members can earn Aeroplan points based on distance flown on all scheduled flights operated by Virgin.

For VA flights wholly within Australia, members can earn status qualifying miles and status qualifying segments, as well as status qualifying dollars for Virgin domestic flights ticketed by AC.

Aeroplan members will also be able to book Virgin flights, which can be combined with flights operated by Air Canada and its other international partners.

Pandaw flexibility

FLEXIBLE booking terms for COVID impacted cruises are now being introduced by Pandaw.

Through to May 2022, all guests who have paid a 20% deposit can change the date or destination of their booking free of charge before 61 days prior to departure where COVID restrictions remain.

For cases within 61 days, Pandaw will provide a cash refund for any amount over pax deposit payment, and will also offer a credit voucher for a client deposit to rebook for a future trip.

Trade blockade ends for Qatar

SAUDI Arabia and its allies have restored diplomatic ties with Qatar after a three-year rift.

Kuwait, a mediator for both sides, announced Saudi Arabia is reopening its airspace, as well as sea and land borders with Qatar, as are Bahrain, Egypt and the United Arab Emirates.

Egypt, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the rest of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) pledged solidarity and signed an agreement last week at the GCC summit.

Relations among the nations soured in 2017, when Saudi Arabia and its allies accused Qatar of supporting terrorism, a charge Qatar strenuously denied.

Key West vote could be kiboshed

A FLORIDA bill could overturn Key West's cruise ship restrictions passed in Nov, which are set to reduce traffic (*TD* 05 Nov).

The legislature would see the state take authority over its ports, scrubbing the local government's autonomy over the facilities.

If passed, Senator Jim Boyd's bill could nullify the referendum vote in Key West, which agreed to limitations regarding ship sizes, passenger numbers and the environmental record of lines.

The bill contends the economic impact of a seaport extends far beyond the boundaries of the port's jurisdiction - more in **CW**.



A CAT which escaped while its owner was taking it through a security checkpoint at New York's LaGuardia Airport has been found safe, after almost two weeks in the terminal ceiling.

The traveller, Taylor Le, was moving from New York to California and booked a flight on Christmas Eve for herself and her six-year-old pet, Muji, reports the *New York Post*.

Transportation Security Administration agents insisted that Taylor remove the frisky feline from her carrier at the screening point, and the cat panicked and wriggled free.

A chase ensued, but ultimately Muji disappeared up a series of platforms and into the roof.

The distraught traveller posted about her plight on Facebook, and a pet travel advocacy group mobilised and helped organise a tracking dog to visit the airport.

The golden retriever indicated a location for Muji up in the ceiling, and Taylor returned to New York to lure her down.

Unfortunately that didn't work, but a few days later the cat emerged and was safely caught in a trap before being reunited with her owner.

The pair flew to California on the weekend, this time with the cat passing through security in an escape-proof harness.

Cairns to the rescue?

CAIRNS Airport Head of Aviation Garry Porter has stated the airport is currently working with airlines, including Air NZ, to secure direct flights to Far North Qld "when the time is right".

"Cairns Airport is working closely with both the state and federal governments, as well as airline carriers as they respond to the changing travel restrictions to accommodate any schedule changes or routes," Porter told *The Cairns Post*.

"We have systems and protocols in place to adjust to these changes whenever they may be needed," he added.

The comments follow the temporary suspension of quarantine-free flights from New Zealand to BNE (**TD** 06 Jan), with Greater Brisbane going into a three-day lockdown amid fears of COVID-19 community infections.

New World Nha Trang hotel in 2023

NEW World Hotels & Resorts has announced it will open the 306-room New World Nha Trang Hotel in Vietnam in 2023.

When it opens, the property will represent the brand's fourth in the Vietnam market, with the second and third of its hotels to open in Hoi An and Phu Quoc later in the year.

Indo plane crash

A BOEING 737-500 Sriwijaya Air flight crashed shortly after take off from the Indonesian capital Jakarta on Sat, likely killing all 62 crew and passengers on board.

The flight was bound for Pontianak in West Kalimantan when it disappeared from radar, with investigators yet to determine a cause for the crash, which could take months.

Although a Boeing aircraft was involved, it should be noted this was not one of its 737 MAX jets.

More people have died in air crashes in Indonesia than in any other country over the past decade, according to Aviation Safety Network's database.
