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SYD board swayed

SYDNEY Airport's board will unanimously recommend that shareholders vote in favour of a revised takeover from the Sydney Aviation Alliance, pending independent expert approval.

The change of position follows another acquisition bid by the consortium which this time sweetened the pot by offering an increased \$8.75 cash per stapled security, a rise from the previous \$8.45 value offered.

Sydney Airport has now granted the suitor permission to conduct due diligence to enable it to put forward a formal binding proposal, which is expected to take around four weeks.

ACCC rejects QF alliance

THE Australian Competition & Consumer Commission (ACCC) has formally rejected a proposal put forward by Qantas and Japan Airlines to coordinate a joint business agreement on flights between Australia and Japan.

The verdict followed a draft decision by the ACCC to knock the collaboration on the head in Mav (TD 06 May), with the consumer watchdog claiming a cooperation between Qantas and JAL would likely lead to reduced competition to the detriment of travellers and competitor airlines.

"The ACCC can only authorise an agreement between

competitors if it is satisfied the public benefits would outweigh the harm to competition - the alliance did not pass this test," ACCC Chair Rod Sims said.

Virgin Australia was vocal in its objection to any planned jointventure, telling the ACCC in a submission that it would be more difficult to enter the Australia-Japan route if it meant competing with Qantas and Japan Airlines acting jointly rather than as individual competing airlines.

When the draft rejection was initially handed down, Qantas stated it would introduce a Cairns to Tokyo route as an incentive to rubber-stamp the proposal, however, the ACCC was unmoved by the commitment.

"We think Qantas could commence a new Cairns service without the alliance, and the timing of any such service would be best determined by commercial factors in a competitive environment," Sims argued, adding that Jetstar services on this route are already planned to start again from Feb 2022 without the alliance.

Qantas expressed its "disappointment" with the call, confirming it means abandoning plans to proceed with the Cairns/Tokyo route as it's "not commercially viable" without JAL.

If the carriers had received the green light, the agreement would have allowed the pair to stop competing on all aspects of price and service for three years.

Dust off the passport

FEDERAL Tourism Minister Dan Tehan has called on Aussies to "dust off their passports" in preparation for the relaunch of international travel.

Speaking to various media outlets over the weekend, Tehan warned that the rebooting of overseas travel in countries like the United States and the United Kingdom had seen "huge queues" in travellers seeking to get lapsed passports renewed, causing delays in people's travel plans.

"In the lead-up to us hitting that 80% mark, look at your passport, dust it off and make sure if you need it reissued to get in early."

Hotels hit in Aug

AMID an increase in COVID-19 cases and lockdowns across Australia, the country's hotel industry reported badly impacted performance levels for Aug, according to data from STR.

Occupancy was recorded at 30.8%, the lowest level in Australia since May 2020, while the average daily rate was \$163.22 and revenue per available room was \$50.33.

The outlook for Sep also looks muted, with only small peaks in occupancy visible for Sep school holidays and key events such as the AFL Grand Final in Perth.

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TA refreshes agent tools

TOURISM Australia (TA) has revamped its Aussie Specialist Program in a bid to make it easier for travel sellers to better promote Australian holidays.

The online program has been given a new look and improved functionality, including greater personalisation, faster qualifying times and shorter more interactive training modules.

Tourism Australia Managing Director Phillipa Harrison said the timing was right for a refresh of the program as travellers here and overseas prepare to make more holiday plans Down Under as borders begin to ease soon.

"Australia remains one of the most desirable travel destinations in the world and the Aussie Specialist Program helps to ensure we will be in the best possible position to convert travel demand into bookings as soon as borders reopen," Harrison said.

"We now have more than

26,000 qualified Aussie Specialists worldwide and hope the new program will allow more agents to complete their learning so they too can best sell Australian tourism experiences," she added.

The Aussie Specialist Program is jointly promoted by Tourism Australia and all eight State and Territory tourism partners, offering travel agents an online platform and training resources to learn about Australia, helping them to promote and sell the destination more effectively.

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HA reactivates Oz

HAWAIIAN Airlines is reportedly preparing to restart flights back to Australia.

The carrier has indicated it plans to resume services between Honolulu and Sydney/Brisbane from 16 Dec, marking the first time in 18 months that its planes have made the journeys.

BNE to LST push

QANTAS will launch three return services a week between Brisbane and Launceston from 01 Nov deploying its QantasLink Boeing 717 aircraft on the route.

The flights will operate until at least the end of Mar 2022, with plans to potentially increase capacity in line with demand.

MEANWHILE Jetstar will also add two extra weekly return services to its existing Brisbane to Launceston route from Nov, bringing the total flights each week aboard its Airbus A320 aircraft to nine.


HAL's 2022 return

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

Largest SAF deal to date



UNITED Airlines has announced its intention to purchase 1.5 billion gallons of sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) from cleantech company Alder Fuels - a move the airline claims is the largest publicly announced agreement of its kind in aviation history.

The acquisition also surpasses its own previous record set in 2015 when it bought 900 million gallons of green fuel from Fulcrum BioEnergy.

UA's CEO Scott Kirby said the latest deal represents a major step towards being truly sustainable and avoiding a reliance on carbon offsets.

"UA has stayed focused on decarbonising without relying on the use of traditional carbon offsets," he said.

"Part of that commitment means increasing SAF usage and availability since it's the fastest way to reduce emissions across our fleet.

"However, to scale SAF as quickly as necessary, we need to look beyond existing solutions and invest in research and development for new pathways like the one Alder is developing," Kirby added.

The US Department of Energy believes agricultural residues alone could provide enough biomass energy to generate more than 17b gallons of jet fuel and displace 75% of US aviation fuel.





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
