#### Back on track sesh

**THE** Travel Community Hub (TTCH) is hosting two webinars this week, including a session tomorrow featuring Travel Daily Publisher Bruce Piper.

### JAL ups Aussie hubs

JAPAN Airlines will boost flight frequencies to Sydney between 31 Oct to 31 Jan, as well as services to Melbourne from 31 Oct to 30 Nov.

### Austrade grant update

AUSTRADE has confirmed there are 189 claims still to be finalised under Round 2 of the Consumer Travel Support Program which opened almost five months ago (TD 03 May), but has not detailed the actual amount of money so far distributed from the \$258m offered under the scheme.

In response to a request from Travel Daily, an Austrade spokesperson said under Round 1 of the program, 3,223 applications for funding were approved, while 2,050 Round 2 applications have been greenlit at this stage.

"The Government is considering options for further support for the tourism and travel sector," the spokesperson told TD, without providing further information on whether further funds remain.

**AFTA Chairman Tom Manwaring** said the Federation remained frustrated by the ongoing delays in finalising the second round of the grants program, "given the dire situation in our industry at large and in particular within our membership businesses".

"Urgent finalisation is required along with advancing the Grant 3 submission approvals," he said.

"The projected start of international travel by Dec... does not diminish the need for continued support for the travel sector," Manwaring said.

The AFTA Chair said "scale of supply - for both air and cruising" was needed for travel businesses to become self-sufficient again.

"This can only be accomplished with full confidence by consumers in travel processes, elimination of quarantine for all vaccinated travellers and permanent border openings," he added.

The Council of Australian Tour Operators (CATO) echoed AFTA's concerns, noting that while there is plenty of anticipation around border openings, "most members of CATO will not genuinely be in a position to recognise revenue until well into next year".

"Without ongoing government support, our industry will not have the capacity to invest, re-employ and prepare for the expected rush of enquiries for new bookings due to pent-up travel demand and consumers wanting to confirm use of future travel credits that are on file," a CATO spokesperson told TD.

"Those that believe travel businesses will quickly return to pre-COVID levels just because borders are open are simply not listening to our case and appeals for ongoing support."

### Qld gets \$70m boost

**QUEENSLAND'S** tourism industry is set to receive a major funding boost, with a joint state and federal government initiative to allocate \$70 million to support struggling businesses.

Under the terms of the package, \$30 million will be targeted at supporting Queensland's iconic tourism attractions, while \$40 million will be used to provide a second round of grants to small, medium and large tourism companies that previously received an initial grant from the Tourism and Hospitality Sector Hardship Program.

To be eligible, businesses will need to be "nationally significant tourism operators and attractions", and show a 50% reduction in turnover and visitation over the three-month period from 01 Jul to 30 Sep 2021, compared to pre-COVID.

### NSW regional delay

A NEW three-step plan out of lockdown has been unveiled by the NSW Government today, with the details confirming the state's residents will not be allowed to travel to regional areas until 80% of double vaccinations have been administered.

Previously, the govt suggested this could be one of the benefits of the state reaching 70% fully jabbed, however, Premier Berejiklian said the revised 80% was needed to ensure all areas of the state are being protected.



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## QF brings date forward

IN AN encouraging sign for domestic travel on the east coast, Qantas will bring forward the relaunch date for travel between Victoria and NSW from 01 Dec to 05 Nov following the speedy progress of the vaccination program in the two states.

"It's great to see plans firming up for some domestic borders opening given the success of the national vaccine rollout," Qantas CEO Alan Joyce enthused.

"We're now planning to ramp up flying between Melbourne and Sydney, which is usually the second busiest air route in the world, almost a month earlier than expected.

"There are also a lot of regional destinations that will open up for the first time since Jun, which is great news for tourism as well as family & friends who can't wait to see each other again," he added.

The airline also revealed plans to significantly increase regional

flying within NSW from 25 Oct in line with the state government's roadmap, resulting in a return to around 40% of pre-COVID levels.

However, the news is not as cheery for travel to Western Australia, with Premier Mark McGowan's tough border stance convincing Qantas to delay the resumption of domestic routes between NSW/Victoria and WA by two months to 01 Feb 2022.

While the airline has restated its commitment to a 18 Dec international restart, its flagship Perth-London service will be temporarily re-routed until at least Apr 2022, with Qantas confirming they are in discussions with the NT Government and Darwin Airport to assess operating the direct London flight from Darwin during this time.

If successful the route would be a daily Melbourne-Darwin-London service, with Melbourne-Singapore-London as the plan b.





### Virgin lights the path to charity



VIRGIN Australia has marked its renewed commitment to the Starlight Children's Foundation by organising a trip to the AFL Grand Final for 18-year-old cancer survivor Kyron Dhu in Perth.

In 2019, Dhu was diagnosed with a rare blood cancer known as Burkitt's lymphoma, but thankfully after six months of treatment, Dhu is in remission.

As part of his Starlight Wish, Virgin Australia flew Dhu and his family from Port Hedland to Perth for a special Premiership Cup visit, as well as giving tickets to see the big match between the Bulldogs and the Demons.

For the past decade, the carrier has helped Starlight grant more than 2,000 wishes like Dhu's, with VA CEO Jayne Hrdlicka stating she was proud to work with such a reputable charity to help grant many more travel wishes.

"Together, we share a common commitment to helping young people and their families to experience the excitement of air travel, and by granting more than 200 unforgettable wishes each year, we're able to ensure that VA remains a force for good in the community," she said.

### Rex suspends to 31 Oct

**REX** Airlines has this morning announced a further extension of its domestic services from 10 Oct to 31 Oct, with the carrier citing the current rate of infection coupled with state border restrictions and lockdowns for motivating the decision.

Rex said it was left with "no other option" than to push its domestic resumption date to the end of next month, as it needs an appropriate lead-in time for advanced ticket sales.

The decision will also prolong the time its staff are furloughed until 31 Oct, however, the airline did note the relaunch date would coincide with the day that all of its customer-facing staff will be fully vaccinated, a health policy Rex announced only last week (TD 20 Sep).

Although the resumption date will see major domestic routes suspended, a limited number of regional flights will remain in place. Rex also confirmed.

"[The new resumption date] will ensure a safer environment for all travel on Rex's network, getting vaccinated is the greatest defence against COVID-19 and key to the lifting of restrictions, lockdowns and border closures," the airline said in a statement.

Rex will have its staff fully jabbed before Qantas and VA, who have set a deadline of 15 Nov for mandatory vaccination.

### FreeGuides app expands globally

**AUSTRALIAN** startup FreeGuides has launched its services internationally earlier than expected, with the company flagging its intentions in Jul to expand globally in 2022.

"When I started FreeGuides in Sydney, we always had plans to take the app global as soon as possible," founder Daniel Wasilewsky said.

"With the impact of COVID it made sense to start locally initially, but now, with the rest of the world continuing to travel and move around, it's the right time to engage new audiences."

The travel guide app successfully raised \$360k in seed funding earlier this year (TD 19 Jul), with backers including noted American tech investor Malik Irfan.

The free app is available on iOS and Android, providing travellers with access to hundreds of selfguided tours curated to meet a range of niche interests.

**THOSE** planning that next big trip to Rome are probably already salivating over the prospect of chowing down on fresh pasta & gelato before checking out major tourist draw cards like The Colosseum, but be warned that you may not be the only one in pig heaven.

The city has recently been invaded by a pack of wild boars (pictured) which have been spotted wandering the Italian city's streets and rummaging through garbage bins.

Although Rome is no stranger to the odd wild boar sighting, the larger numbers have infuriated residents who have made it a major election topic in the current race for Mayor.

The brazen band of hogs last week took to mingling among parents as they waited to collect their children from a school in the Monte Mario district, and in May several pigs robbed a woman of her shopping in a supermarket car park, ferociously consuming its contents minutes later.

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#### **HNA** execs arrested

**HNA** Group Chairman Chen Feng and Chief Executive Officer Adam Tan have both been detained by police in Hainan.

The parent company of Hainan Airlines said its operations are not affected and its restructuring work is continuing, having been under a court-led bankruptcy and reorganisation process since Jan.

The two men have been arrested on "suspected crimes", with no further details revealed at this stage, however the news follows a broader crackdown by the Chinese Govt on the financial dealings of the private sector.

HNA aggressively scooped up assets around the world from 2015 to 2017, buying stakes in Hilton Hotels & Resorts, Deutsche Bank and more, resulting in more than US\$40b worth of deals.

The shopping spree saddled the company with debt, resulting in HNA reversing course and selling many of its overseas assets, with COVID also battering its profits.

#### QF routes take off

THE first of two new Qantas routes from Adelaide to Hobart and Cairns, flagged earlier this year (TD 26 May), have taken flight this morning.

QantasLink's first flight from Adelaide to Hobart landed earlier today, with the first Cairns service scheduled for tomorrow afternoon.

The airline will operate seven weekly return flights to Hobart and four to Cairns.

### Vic joins in on trial

SIX regional Victorian local government areas will host vaccine passport trials from 11 Oct as the state edges closer to its 70% double dose target.

Buloke, Pyrenees, Bass Coast, Greater Bendigo, East Gippsland and Warrnambool will test the passport, while Victoria will hit the vaccine milestone on 26 Oct, with 47% of the eligible population now fully vaccinated.


The call for cooperation follows a sharp increase in unruly passenger behaviour in the US, with 3,100 reports of plane violence between Jan and Jun.
