SIA premium revamp

EXPANDED food and beverage options and a new amenity kit have been unveiled by Singapore Airlines to improve its premium economy experience.

Pax will now be offered a glass of Charles de Cazanove Brut Tradition NV champagne after take-off and access to a roving selection of 200 new meals.

On flights of seven hours or more, pax will also be given eco amenity kits curated by new partner Out of the Woods.

UBER has this morning agreed to settle a long-running class action with taxi and hire car drivers, paying out the fifthlargest class action amount in Australian legal history.

The case was prosecuted by Maurice Blackburn Lawyers on behalf of 8,000 taxi and hire car owners, who claimed they had lost significant income when Uber "aggressively" entered the Australian market in 2012.

UBER

As a result, Uber has agreed in-principle to compensate the plaintiffs to the tune of \$272 million, a figure the ride-sharing platform said reflected the evolved state of regulations, which have now caught up to the transport sector.

"When Uber started more than a decade ago, ridesharing regulations did not exist anywhere in the world, let alone Australia," Uber said.

"Today is different and Uber is now regulated in every state and territory across Australia, and governments recognise us as an important part of the nation's transport mix."

Uber also stated it had made significant contributions to statelevel taxi compensation schemes over the years, and in conjunction with today's settlement. deserves to put its "legacy issues firmly in our past". AB

Virgin Max delays

VIRGIN Australia has confirmed there will be delays to some 737 Max-8 aircraft entering its fleet.

The carrier told **TD** this morning that it will be working hard to "minimise impacts" to its schedule in light of the hold up, which has been caused by ongoing safety issues with Boeing's Max model aircraft.

VA has so far taken delivery of four 737 Max-8s and has a further 10 in the pipeline, with the carrier expecting to take delivery of four more this year.

The remaining six will join the fleet from early 2025 and in the longer term, VA said it expects to receive up to 25 737 Max-10s from 2026 onwards.

CATO makes capital move



THE Council of Australian Tour Operators (CATO) was in Canberra last week to lobby key government departments about the biggest issues currently facing the land-supply sector.

Among the topics raised by CATO was a recommendation to expand the Reviving International Travel Grant (RITG) program to bolster opportunities for grantees within its membership.

The industry body and the Australian Tourism Export Council had an important victory last year regarding the RITG when the Federal Government formally approved a second round of funding (TD 01 Dec 2023).

Another crucial meeting was held with Tourism Research Australia (TRA), with CATO advocating for a new and "extensive" economic impact study to be published to support the outbound leisure travel.

The proposed economic impact report would utilise a range of data sources to provide insights into the industry's current and future trajectories.

CATO suggested such a study would empower stakeholders with more data-driven strategies for a greater sustainable growth.

During the tour of the nation's capital, CATO also met with the Egyptian Embassy to discuss the importance of the African country being a gateway to outbound travel in Australia and a perceived unfair Smartraveller advisory, which currently suggests Aussie travellers should "reconsider their need to travel".

The Federal Government has its advisory set at such a high level because of the threat of terrorist attacks, exacerbated by the ongoing Israel-Hamas conflict.

However, CATO believes Egypt plays a pivotal role in attracting tourism to the Middle East, and with a review of Egypt's advisory to take place in two weeks, felt it pertinent to hold talks with the Egyptian Ambassador to Australia, Hani Nagi.

"Discussions were held on how CATO, its members, and the Egyptian Embassy, can work together to further boost Australian tourism to Egypt and the surrounding region," CATO MD Brett Jardine said.

The industry body also noted there had been "robust growth" in tourism traffic to Egypt in recent years, with a 42% increase in 2023 compared to 2018, matching the pre-pandemic levels of 2019.

QF confirms loyalty revamp EXCLUSIVE

QANTAS has confirmed it will introduce "significant" improvements to its Frequent Flyer program in Apr.

Speaking with Travel Daily this morning, a spokesperson for the carrier confirmed rumours reported on by the AFR on Fri are accurate, and that changes to its loyalty program will see better points exchanges for flights.

"We're still working to finalise the frequent flyer improvements, which are responding to what members are telling us about the importance of redeeming points for flights at the times they most want to fly," Qantas said.

"It's a significant investment that will deliver great value for members, but it also makes sense for the program & our partners." However, Qantas was also quick

to stress that any changes it makes to its loyalty structure will not impact the existing Classic

Flight Reward program, with the flagged new scheme to be an "additional way" for members to use points to book flights.

While Qantas declined to divulge a name for the new loyalty scheme, AFR reporting suggests it will be called Classic+ and allow members to convert one point to 1¢ for economy flights - equating to 10,000 points needed for a \$100 flight.

In the airline's latest financial results, it revealed the business had already invested \$50 million into its existing Classic Flight Rewards program to "unlock more reward seats". AB

LA800 cockpit error

A MISTAKE by a flight attendant which pushed the pilot seat forward and into the controls is now considered the most likely cause of LATAM Airlines' mid-air altitude plummet last week.

According to preliminary evidence into the incident, the attendant may have accidentally hit the switch during meal service.

Boeing has now issued a communique to all airlines advising to check the placement and rigidity of its cockpit seats. Mohammed Al-Meer said the new product will be "something new" which combines QR's experience flying both commercial and private jets.

"We are 70-80% ready and are only finalising colours," Al-Meer told the US network.

Al-Meer added the hyper competitive landscape in Gulf aviation was helping to raise the bar in customer experience terms but that he was confident Qatar Airways will maintain its market leading position and "outshine any competition".

Qatar Airways is preparing to add Hamburg and Tashkent as its two newest destinations, along with resuming flights to several seasonal ports including Marrakesh, Mykonos & Sarajevo.

Al-Meer said digital innovation was also helping to maximise organisational efficiency and add new ports in key markets, including China and India. *ML*

UN Visa openness

THE world is more open now than ever before, according to the latest UN Tourism Visa Openness Index released last week, with fewer passport holders requiring traditional visas to travel.

The report showed the world has essentially returned to its pre-pandemic status in terms of global mobility, with 21% of the world's population now able to travel without a visa at all.

Asia and the Pacific were found to be the most receptive region for traveller movement with an Openness Score of 46, compared to the global average of 40.

The world leader for openness was the Cook Islands, which earned an Openness score of 100, meaning it welcomed travellers under any passport or visa.

Conversely, North America and both north and western Europe were deemed most restrictive, with the USA in particular scoring just 12 and comfortably taking out the 'most restrictive' title.

The future is worth its salt



DESPITE a cost-of-living crisis and nervousness in the economy, spend on travel will continue to surge, according to futurist and columnist Bernard Salt.

The high-profile prognosticator was the keynote speaker at the 2024 Virtuoso Forum in Bangkok, where he suggested a number of key factors will continue to drive travel spend through the current economic climate.

"After calamity, you want to celebrate life, it's what humanity does after disasters that last four or five years on a global scale," Salt argued.

The Australian columnist added the resurgence in travel spend is likely to continue well into the next decade.

"You have prosperity in Australia and New Zealand, the effects of the pandemic have now ended, you have a generational shift, and you have the savings of an entire generation in superannuation - all of which are unleashed in this decade".

Salt shared that Australians had put \$3.5 trillion into superannuation for the purpose of Baby Boomers to spend on travel over the next 10 years.

"We measure social sophistication and success by the ability to travel - we're tucked away on the other side of the world, being able to connect and to travel is very important to Australians and New Zealanders," Salt posited. *DF*

Explore to Tunisia

EXPLORE Worldwide has operated its first group departure in Tunisia in nine years, launching a new itinerary to the African nation to meet renewed demand.

The 10-day 'Best of Tunisia' tour starts in the capital Tunis and includes one night in a cave hotel, along with visits to the cities of Tozeur and Hammamet.

The company has scheduled nine departures for 2024 and is selling 13 more for next year.

Tunisia was removed from Explore's product range in 2015 after a series of terrorist attacks at a museum and a holiday resort targeted foreign visitors.



AFTER initially protesting his innocence, Hollywood actor Pierce Brosnan has pleaded guilty to stepping off a trail in a thermal area during a visit to Yellowstone National Park in the United States last year.

Taking to Instagram to explain himself, Brosnan said: "As an environmentalist I have the utmost respect for and love of our natural world, however, I made an impulsive mistake - one that I do not take lightly - when entering a thermal area covered in snow in Yellowstone National Park to take a photograph".

The actor added that he did not see the 'No Trespassing' sign posted that warned of any danger, and nor did he hike in the immediate area.

"I deeply regret my transgression and offer my heartfelt apologies to all for trespassing in this sensitive area, Yellowstone and all our National Parks are to be cared for and preserved," he added.

Trash has also been washed downstream from villages inland, with Kuta Beach, Legian Beach, and Seminyak's coastline hit hard.

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
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
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
